Section 551.074. To deliberate the appointment, employment, evaluation, reassignment, duties, discipline, or dismissal of a public officer or employee; or to hear a complaint or charge against an officer or employee.

Section 551.076. To deliberate the deployment, or specific occasions for implementation, of security personnel or devices.

Section 551.086. To deliberate vote or take final action on any competitive matters relating to public power utilities.

Section 551.087. To deliberate or discussion regarding commercial or financial information that the governmental body has received from a business prospect that the governmental body seeks to have locate, stay, or expand in or near the territory of the governmental body and with which the governmental body is conducting economic development negotiations; or to deliberate the offer of a financial or other incentive to a business prospect.

Section 551.088. To deliberate a test item or information related to a test item if the governmental body believes that the test item may be included in a test the governmental body administers to individuals who seek to obtain or renew a license or certificate that is necessary to engage in an activity.

After discussion of any matters in executive session, any final action or vote taken will be in public by the City Council.

City Council shall have the right at anytime to seek legal advice in Executive Session from its Attorney on any agenda item, whether posted for Executive Session or not.

Esteemed Members of the Lockhart City Council:

I am Gene Galbraith, Founder, President, and Curator of the Southwest Museum of Clocks & Watches.

Thank you for giving us an opportunity to make this presentation on behalf of the Museum for a share of the Hotel/Motel Tax.

The SW Museum of Clocks & Watches has as its mission: "The preservation of timepieces and the Horological arts for today's visitors and the unborn generations yet to come into the Realm of Time."

We will mark our **Twelfth Anniversary** in March 2019. Hundreds of visitors have walked through our doors to see and hear about the Wonders of Time. Senior citizens, young children, and all ages in between, have come to enjoy the **Award-Winning Museum Deep in the Heart of Texas**.

During the year of 2018, the Museum has been recognized by the University of Texas in the *Alcalde* magazine for Texas Exes' contributions to society through horology and museums.

The cover story of the *Horological Times* magazine, published by the American Watchmaker-Clockmaker Institute, paid tribute to the Museum for its excellence in the Horological Arts.

The *Texas Highways* magazine highlighted the SW Museum of Clocks & Watches as the place to visit in Lockhart, Texas.

Lockhart Downtown Business Association Application for HOT Funds 2019

We are a newly formed 501c6 (see attached formation papers). The mission of the Lockhart Downtown Business Association is to create and retain interest in and awareness of the vibrant historic downtown commercial district. We promote the success of individual businesses through publicity, creative marketing and exciting public events.

On Tuesday, Nov. 20th, the LDBA confirmed support and participation in the 2019 Texas Music Swing and BBQ Festival in Lockhart slated for September 27, 28 and 29th. This event was produced in 2018 by Al Dressen, founder of the event that started in 1985 in Austin and was held in recent years in San Marcos. Our LDBA heavily supported the event last year. We have volunteered to assist Al Dressen in handling funds and donations in our bank account at First Lockhart National Bank as well as support the event with volunteers. We all know that this 3-day event puts heads in beds in Lockhart. We believe the first year event here was a success and will only increase with attendance every year. We anticipate double or triple attendance. The Friday night "Gathering" with dinner and presentation of the Hall of Fame awards was well attended. Rain did deter some people from attending on Saturday.

The September 2018 event was particially funded by the City of Lockhart thru Downtown Revitalization Events Committee funds of \$5000. We know that this money source is not longer available as it has all been distributed to our best knowledge. Therefore, we are asking for \$5000 from the HOT Funds to be awarded to the LDBA to help host this event because it is a gathering of people that enhance and promote tourism and the ... hotel industry. "Tourist means an individual who travels from the individual's residence to a different municipality, county, state, or country for pleasure, recreation, education, or culture." ¹

Some of the expenditures that we could use the funds for include but are not limited to items specifically taken from the Texas Tax Code, Title 3, Chapter 351.101, SUBCHAPTER B. USE AND ALLOCATION OF REVENUE Sec. 351.101. USE OF TAX REVENUE.

- (3) advertising and conducting solicitations and promotional programs to attract tourists and convention delegates or registrants to the municipality or its vicinity;
- (4) the encouragement, promotion, improvement, and application of the arts, including <u>instrumental and vocal music</u>, <u>dance</u>, drama, folk art, creative writing, architecture, design and allied fields, painting, sculpture, photography, graphic and craft arts, motion pictures, radio, television, tape and sound recording, and other arts related to the presentation, performance, execution, and exhibition of these major art forms;

We plan to add a western art show in 2019, more dance lessons, western apparell vendors and western jewelry maker vendors.

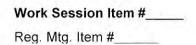

Good morning. Yes there is a regular scheduled meeting. The meetings are every 4th Tuesday at 6:00 p.m. The board of directors only meets once a month, unless there is a need for a special meeting. The members do not receive compensation. Some of the primary duties of the BOD are:

- 1. Hire a chief appraiser
- 2. Adopt the CAD's annual budget
- 3. Appoint ARB members
- 4. Select a chair and secretary from among ARB members
- 5. Appoint Ag advisory board members

To be eligible to serve on the board the individual must be a resident of the CAD and have resided in the CAD for at least two year immediately preceding the date of taking office. The individual must also not have any delinquent taxes. If they do have delinquent taxes they must be under an installment agreement or has deferred or abated a suit to collect the delinquent taxes. A person who has appraised for compensation or represented property owners for compensation within 5 years is ineligible to serve. If the individual is related with in the second degree of consanguinity or affinity to an appraiser who appraiser property for use under the Tax Code or a person who represent property owners for compensation in proceeding under the Tax Code in the CAD.

I have attached a copy of the Appraisal District Directors Manual from the state Comptroller's office that will list in detail all of the responsibilities and eligibility requirements of the BOD.

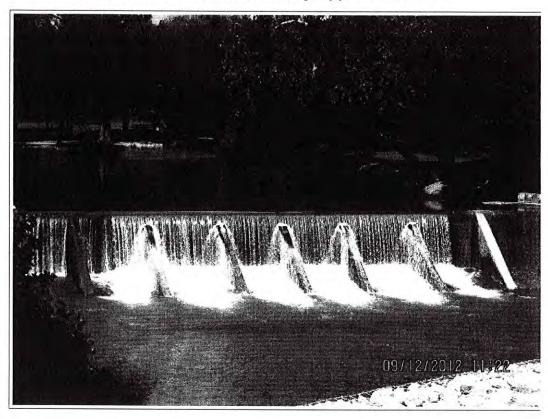

The local property tax system follows the principle of checks and balances. An appraisal district board of directors hires the chief appraiser, sets the budget and appoints the appraisal review board members.

The directors have no authority to set values or appraisal methods. The chief appraiser carries out the appraisal district's legal duties, hires the staff, makes the appraisals and operates the appraisal office.

RESOLUTION TO NOTIFY TAXING UNITS OF VACANCY ON BOARD OF DIRECTORS

WHEREAS, a vacancy has occurred on the Caldwell County Appraisal District Board of Directors; and

WHEREAS, §6.03(1) of the Texas Tax Code provides for notification by the Board of Directors to each taxing unit that is entitled to vote for director of the vacancy; and

WHEREAS, §6.03(*l*) of the Code provides that each eligible taxing unit may nominate by resolution adopted by its governing body a candidate to fill the vacancy, and such taxing unit shall submit its nominee to the chief appraiser within 45 days of notification by the Board of Directors;

NOW THEREFORE, be it resolved that each taxing unit entitled to vote as provided by §6.03 of the Texas Tax Code shall be sent notice that there exists a vacancy on the Caldwell County Appraisal District Board of Directors.

- (k) The governing body of each taxing unit entitled to vote shall determine its vote by resolution and submit it to the chief appraiser before December 15. The chief appraiser shall count the votes, declare the five candidates who receive the largest cumulative vote totals elected, and submit the results before December 31 to the governing body of each taxing unit in the district and to the candidates. For purposes of determining the number of votes received by the candidates, the candidate receiving the most votes of the conservation and reclamation districts is considered to have received all of the votes cast by conservation and reclamation districts and the other candidates are considered not to have received any votes of the conservation and reclamation districts. The chief appraiser shall resolve a tie vote by any method of chance.
- (l) If a vacancy occurs on the board of directors other than a vacancy in the position held by a county assessor-collector serving as a nonvoting director, each taxing unit that is entitled to vote by this section may nominate by resolution adopted by its governing body a candidate to fill the vacancy. The unit shall submit the name of its nominee to the chief appraiser within 45 days after notification from the board of directors of the existence of the vacancy, and the chief appraiser shall prepare and deliver to the board of directors within the next five days a list of the nominees. The board of directors shall elect by majority vote of its members one of the nominees to fill the vacancy.

Provisions of Tex. Tax Code Ann. §§ 6.01, 6.03, 23.01, 25.21 expressly provide the necessary authority for an appraisal review board to ensure that the mineral interests of a county are appraised based on market value, unreduced by fraud, and for local taxing units to bring a challenge, if necessary, to insist that the appraisal review board do so. Therefore, the court issued a writ of mandamus directing a district court to vacate its order denying pleas to jurisdiction and to dismiss an action brought by local taxing units alleging that certain companies owning oil properties in the county committed fraud and conspiracy with respect to the valuation of the oil properties for ad valorem tax purposes. Under Tex. Const. art. V, § 8, the district court did not have subject matter jurisdiction because the legislature had provided that the claim had to be heard before the appraisal review board. In re ExxonMobil Corp., 153 S.W.3d 605, 2004 Tex. App. LEXIS 7811 (Tex. App. Amarillo 2004).

NOTES: AIRPORT ADVISORY BOARD	Sec. 4-26. Membership; appointments. The Lockhart Airport Advisory Board shall be composed of seven members to be appointed in accordance with section 2-210. At least five members must currently be or have been flight rated, and two members may be appointed as at-large members. Members shall serve three-year terms, such terms coinciding with the council position making the appointment. Sec. 4-28. Eligibility for board membership. No person having a financial interest in any commercial carrier by air, or in any concession, right or privilege to conduct any business or render any service for compensation upon the premises of the Lockhart Municipal Airport shall be eligible for membership on the Lockhart Airport Advisory Board. Sec. 4-32. Limitations of authority. The Lockhart Municipal Airport Advisory Board shall not have authority to incur or create any debt in connection with airport operations; nor shall the board be empowered to enter into any contract, leases, or other legal obligations binding upon the City of Lockhart; nor shall the board have authority to hire airport personnel or direct airport personnel in the execution of their duties.
NOTES: CONSTRUCTIO N BOARD APPOINTMENTS	Section B101.4, Board Decision, is amended to read as follows: The construction board of adjustments and appeals shall have the power, as further defined in Appendix B, to hear appeals of decisions and interpretations of the building official and consider variances of the technical codes; and to conduct hearings on determinations of the building official regarding unsafe or dangerous buildings, structures and/official service systems, and to issue orders in accordance with the procedures beginning with section 12-442 of this Code [of Ordinances]. (a) Appointments to the examining and supervisory board of electricians and appeals shall conform to section 2-210 except that the board shall consist of five persons with one being appointed by each district council member and one by the mayor. Each member shall serve three-year terms with such terms to coincide with the council position making the appointment. (b) Each board member shall reside within the county and such board shall include one member who shall be a building contractor; one layman; two members shall be maste electricians who are currently licensed by the city; and one member shall be either a building contractor or master electrician licensed by the city. There shall be two ex-officion members, one who shall be the city electrical inspector, and one shall be the fire marshal. Sec. 12-133. Officers and quorum. The members of the examining and supervising board of electricians and appeals shall select a chairman and secretary. A quorum shall consist of three members.
NOTES: HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION	Sec. 28-3. Historical preservation commission. (b) The commission shall consist of seven members, appointed by the city council in accordance with section 2-210, who shall whenever possible meet one or more of the following qualities: (1) A registered architect, planner or representative of a design profession, (2) A registered professional engineer in the State of Texas, (3) A member of a nonprofit historical organization of Caldwell County, (4) A local licensed real estate broker or member of the financial community, (5) An owner of an historic landmark residential building, (6) An owner or tenant of a business property that is an historic landmark or in an historic district, (7) A member of the Caldwell County Historical Commission.
NOTES: PARKS ADVISORY BOARD	Sec. 40-133. Members. (a) The board shall consist of seven members appointed in accordance with section 2-210 to serve three years terms, such terms to coincide with the council position making the appointment and two alternates shall also be appointed by the mayor and mayor pro-tem, one each. The two alternates shall also serve the term coinciding with the council position making the appointments. Sec. 2-209. - Rules for appointment.

The city council hereby sets the following rules:

- (1) Except as may be established by existing city ordinances/resolutions the process for selecting members shall be open to all Lockhart citizens, who must apply for appointment, to include those applying for reappointment. Reappointment shall not be deemed automatic.
- (2) Council shall seek to appoint the most qualified or best persons available, while also respecting the need for diverse community opinions.
- (3) No member of any appointed body shall serve on more than one quasi-judicial or advisory board or commission.
- (4) No appointed body shall deviate from its charge, deliberate items not on its agendas, or speak for the council or City of Lockhart without council authorization.
- (5) Subject to other qualifications as specifically required for membership on the below boards and commissions, the city council shall have the right (but not the duty) to appoint up to two members who are not Lockhart citizens but who are residents of Caldwell County to the Lockhart Airport Advisory Board, the Eugene Clark Library Board, and the construction board of appeals.
- (6) Subject to other qualifications as specifically required for membership on the below boards and commissions, the city council shall have the right (but not the duty) to appoint up to two members who are not Lockhart citizens but who are residents of Caldwell County, to the Lockhart Airport Advisory Board, the Eugene Clark Library Board, and the construction board of appeals.

Section 2-210. Method of selection; number of members; terms.

- (a) The mayor and city councilmembers shall nominate individuals to serve on boards and commissions. Each nomination shall then be confirmed by a simple majority of the entire city council.
- (b) Except as provided herein, there shall be seven members appointed to each board or commission corresponding with the seven members or places of the city council. Each city councilmember, except at provided herein, shall nominate a qualified person to serve in a place on an appointed body corresponding to their place on the council. At-large councilmembers shall be designated as places 5 and 6, and the mayor's position as place 7, for the purpose of this section. Nominations shall be made to fill vacant positions and/or positions whose terms have expired within 90 days of the event, such as a resignation or an election. Should any city councilmember fail to name an appointee to one of his/her corresponding places on any body within the above described 90 days, another councilmember shall then have the privilege to nominate a person to fill that same position, as described in subsection (a). However, once that position becomes vacant again for any reason, the appointment shall revert to the place corresponding with the original city council seat/place number for nominations.
- (c) Beginning with the election in May, 1998, the council shall nominate and confirm four members to serve in places 1, 2, 5, 6 on each board and commission in accordance with subsections (a) and (b) above, and with the standards set in Ordinance Number 97-09, Governance Policies. With the election of May, 1999, the remaining three places shall be filled following the same procedure as above.
- (d)Terms of service on appointed bodies shall be the same three-year terms as the councilmember who nominates a person to serve. However, a person may be appointed to complete the unexpired term of a vacant position, due to a resignation, for example.
- (e) When a person has completed a term, or terms, of service and will be vacating a place, that person may continue to serve until a replacement is nominated and confirmed by the city council.
- (f) At the discretion of the majority of the city council, one Caldwell County resident who is also an owner of real property within any local historic district may be appointed as a full member to the historical preservation commission.
- (g) Exceptions to the above regulations shall be all volunteer/special purpose/ad hoc committees appointed from time to time by the city council and the zoning board of adjustments, whose members shall serve two-year terms in accordance with V.T.C.A., Local Government Code § 211.008. All other provisions of this section, and ordinance number 97-09 which do not conflict with the chapters establishing these bodies shall be applicable.

Sec. 2-212. Removal and resignation of members.

- (a) All board, commission and committee members serve at the pleasure of the city council and may be removed from office with or without cause at the discretion of the city council.
- (b) Board, commission and committee members may resign from office at any time by filing a written resignation, dated and signed by the member, with the City Secretary. Such resignation shall take effect upon receipt by the City Secretary without further action by the city council. If the city council appoints a new member to replace the resigned member, the new member shall be appointed to serve out the remainder of the resigned member's term.
