Section 551.087. To deliberate or discussion regarding commercial or financial information that the governmental body has received from a business prospect that the governmental body seeks to have locate, stay, or expand in or near the territory of the governmental body and with which the governmental body is conducting economic development negotiations; or to deliberate the offer of a financial or other incentive to a business prospect.

Section 551,088. To deliberate a test item or information related to a test item if the governmental body believes that the test item may be included in a test the governmental body administers to individuals who seek to obtain or renew a license or certificate that is necessary to engage in an activity.

Mayor White opened the work session and advised the Council, staff and the audience that staff would provide information and explanations about the following items:

PRESENTATION ONLY

Mayor White presented the following proclamations:

- A. Presentation of proclamation declaring March 31, 2017 as Cesar Chavez Farmworker Appreciation Day.
- B. Presentation of a Proclamation declaring April 4, 2017 as National Service Recognition Day in Lockhart.
- C. Reading of Proclamation acknowledging and declaring April 2017 as Fair Housing Month.

Mayor White announced that Councilman Westmoreland would be absent.

DISCUSSION ONLY

A. DISCUSS MINUTES OF THE CITY COUNCIL MEETING OF MARCH 21, 2017.

Mayor White requested corrections to the minutes. There were corrections.

B. DISCUSS PROPOSED THREE YEAR AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF LOCKHART AND THE TEXAS MASTER GARDNER ASSOCIATION, INC. FOR USE OF THE GARDEN SPACE ON CITY PROPERTY ON N. MEDINA STREET JUST NORTH OF THE CALDWELL MINISTERIAL ALLIANCE FOOD BANK; THE GROUP WOULD BE RESPONSIBLE FOR THE MAINTENANCE AND UPKEEP OF THE AREA, PROVIDING SOME FRESH VEGETABLES TO THE FOOD BANK, EDUCATING LOCAL COMMUNITY GROUPS AND INDIVIDUALS AND ENCOURAGING THEM TO BE INVOLVED WITH GARDENING, AND APPOINTING THE MAYOR TO SIGN THE AGREEMENT IF APPROVED.

Mr. Rodgers stated that the Texas Master Gardener Association, Inc. approached the Mayor and City Manager about the possibility of an agreement for use of the gardening area. The organization is a 501(c)(3) entity. Members have been working the gardening space for more than a year. They would like to make several improvements at the site that involve a lot of sweat equity and some funds but they do not want to do this without some type of agreement to protect their investment. Much of the garden produce would be donated to the Food Bank. They encourage Lockhart Independent School District (LISD) at Risk Students and Key Club members to be involved. Gardening education will be an integral part of the program. The agreement would be for three (3) years with automatic renewals of one (1) year unless a thirty (30) day notice is provided by either agreement party. The City shall have the right to terminate the agreement at any time for justifiable cause. Mr. Rodgers recommended approval. There was discussion.

Tommie Clayton, President of the Texas Sage Master Gardeners Association (TSMGA) provided information about the goals of the TSMGA that includes teaching students and citizens of the community about gardening and to be able to provide fresh produce to the food bank.

C. DISCUSS CHANGE ORDER #3 FOR QRO-MEX CONSTRUCTION COMPANY, INC., TO INCREASE THE CURRENT CONTRACT BY AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$30,000.00 FOR SIDEWALK AND HEADWALL CHANGES ON EAST WALNUT STREET NEAR GREENHILL CHURCH OF CHRIST TO ACCOMMODATE DRAINAGE WORK MAKING THE NEW POTENTIAL CONTRACT AMOUNT \$2,185,000, AND APPOINTING THE MAYOR TO SIGN THE CHANGE ORDER WHEN PREPARED IF APPROVED.

Mr. Rodgers stated that Qro-Mex Construction Company, Inc. has the current contract to perform utility, drainage, and street improvements on the Richland Drive project and on the Mesquite-Braden-Vega-Wichita Street project and East Walnut Streets; the unit prices for the work were very good. The contractor has agreed to construct a redesign of the sidewalk and headwall appurtenances on East Walnut Street to more efficiently serve the Greenhill Church of Christ. The total current contract including the two previous change orders is \$2,154,616. The proposed Change Order #3 up to \$30,000, if approved would make the total contract \$2,185,000. The percentage increase of the original contract, if approved, is still less than the 25% allowable. There was discussion. Mr. Rodgers recommended approval.

D. DISCUSS ORDINANCE 2017-09 AMENDING CHAPTER 58, UTILITIES, DIVISION 2, HARMFUL OR INDUSTRIAL DISCHARGES, SECTION 58-241, ITEMS SUBJECT TO REGULATION-DESIGNATED, SUBSECTION (13)(A) MATERIALS WHICH EXERT OR CAUSE (HARMFUL DISCHARGES INTO THE CITY'S WASTEWATER SYSTEM).

Mr. Rodgers stated that this ordinance amends the amount of allowable total suspended dissolved solids for wastewater discharges for such as, but not limited to, sodium chloride and sodium sulfate. The existing ordinance allows only up to 500 milligrams per liter which is unreasonable and detrimental to business and industrial development. Staff suspects that when the ordinance was originally written the number should have been 5,000 milligrams per liter instead of the 500. For consideration, Lockhart's approved drinking water averages about 500 milligrams per liter of total suspended dissolved solids. Many cities do not place a limit on total suspended dissolved solids, but staff believes the 5,000 would be needed as a cap to avoid large amounts of sodium chloride and sulfates (salts) from being dumped directly into the wastewater system which may not cause corrosive problems for clay wastewater pipes and concrete manholes. If a business produces excessive amounts, then a pre-filtration process would be required. Mr. Rodgers recommended approval. There was discussion.

E. DISCUSS TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION (TXDOT) CHANGE ORDERS 1, 6 AND 7 TOTALING \$2,418,551.53 MOST OF WHICH WAS TO PLACE UNDERGROUND DRAINAGE IN PHASE II OF THE US 183 PROJECT BETWEEN BLACKJACK AND WALMART, AND APPOINTING THE MAYOR TO SIGN THE DOCUMENTS IF APPROVED.

Mr. Rodgers stated that TxDOT provided change order numbers 1, 6 and 7 totaling \$2,418,551.53, the vast majority of which was for placing underground drainage between Blackjack and Walmart on US 183 south in Phase II of the project. The Capital Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (CAMPO) and TxDOT provided additional funding to help cover these costs. Mr. Rodgers recommended approval. There was discussion.

F. DISCUSS PROPOSED INCREASE OF \$200.00 PER MONTH FOR MUNICIPAL COURT JUDGE, FRANK COGGINS.

Mayor White stated that Judge Coggins recently inquired about a small salary increase. He requested the Council's consideration regarding the salary increase. There was discussion.

REGULAR MEETING

ITEM 1. CALL TO ORDER.

Mayor Lew White called the regular meeting of the Lockhart City Council to order on this date at 7:30 p.m.

ITEM 2. INVOCATION, PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE.

Invocation - Ministerial Alliance.

Pledge of Allegiance to the United States and Texas flags.

ITEM 3. CITIZENS/VISITORS COMMENTS.

Mayor White requested citizens to address the Council. There were none.

ITEM 4-A. HOLD A PUBLIC HEARING ON APPLICATION ZC-17-04 BY ESTHER HERNANDEZ FOR A ZONING CHANGE FROM IH INDUSTRIAL HEAVY DISTRICT TO CMB COMMERCIAL MEDIUM BUSINESS DISTRICT FOR 0.374 ACRE IN THE BYRD LOCKHART SURVEY, ABSTRACT NO. 17, LOCATED AT 308 NORTH COLORADO STREET (US 183). Mayor White opened the public hearing at 7:34 p.m. and requested the staff report.

Mr. Gibson stated that the building on the subject property was previously occupied by a bar, which was a nonconforming but grandfathered use in the current IH zoning. However, it has now been vacant longer than six months, and therefore, is no longer grandfathered for that use. The new owner desires to have a hair salon in the building, and a portable food establishment (trailer) outside. Such uses outside of the CCB district require a commercial zoning classification of either CMB or CHB. The requested CMB classification does not allow bars, so it would eliminate any chance of the use of the property resuming as a bar. The proposed change from IH to CMB represents a decrease in potential intensity. Considering that the closest land uses other than the City Park are commercial and industrial, and those uses will continue to have the IH industrial zoning classification, the requested zoning change should have no effect on the surrounding area. Because the existing building is small and is not designed for an industrial use, the CMB zoning classification would simply allow potential uses to be in compliance with the zoning of the property. The requested CMB zoning classification is not consistent with the Lockhart 2020 Future Land Use Plan map, which designates the subject tracts as Medium Density Residential. However, considering that the immediate area is dominated by Livengood's Feeds and Lockhart Gin, which are both industrial uses, it is unlikely that the area will be suitable for residential uses of any type in the foreseeable future. No opposition to the zoning change has been expressed. Mr. Gibson stated that the Planning and Zoning Commission and staff recommend approval.

Mayor White requested citizens to address the Council in favor of or against the zoning change. There were none. He closed the public hearing at 7:43 p.m.

ITEM 4-B. DISCUSSION AND/OR ACTION TO CONSIDER ORDINANCE 2017-07 AMENDING THE OFFICIAL ZONING MAP OF THE CITY OF LOCKHART, TEXAS, TO RECLASSIFY THE PROPERTY KNOWN AS 0.374 ACRE IN THE BYRD LOCKHART SURVEY, ABSTRACT NO. 17, LOCATED AT 308 NORTH COLORADO STREET (US 183), FROM IH INDUSTRIAL HEAVY DISTRICT TO CMB COMMERCIAL MEDIUM BUSINESS DISTRICT.

Mayor Pro-Tem Sanchez made a motion to approve Ordinance 2017-07, as presented. Councilmember Mendoza seconded. The motion passed by a vote of 6-0.

ITEM 5-B. APPROVE A PROPOSED THREE YEAR AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF LOCKHART AND THE TEXAS MASTER GARDNER ASSOCIATION, INC. FOR USE OF THE GARDEN SPACE ON CITY PROPERTY ON N. MEDINA STREET JUST NORTH OF THE CALDWELL MINISTERIAL ALLIANCE FOOD BANK; THE GROUP WOULD BE RESPONSIBLE FOR THE MAINTENANCE AND UPKEEP OF THE AREA, PROVIDING SOME FRESH VEGETABLES TO THE FOOD BANK, EDUCATING LOCAL COMMUNITY GROUPS AND INDIVIDUALS AND ENCOURAGING THEM TO BE INVOLVED WITH GARDENING, AND APPOINTING THE MAYOR TO SIGN THE AGREEMENT IF APPROVED.

Mayor White pulled the item from the consent agenda to allow for consideration. There was brief discussion.

<u>Councilmember Michelson made a motion to approve the agreement, as presented. Mayor Pro-Tem Sanchez seconded.</u> The motion passed by a vote of 6-0.

ITEM 4-C. HOLD A PUBLIC HEARING REGARDING AMENDING CHAPTER 31, LOCKHART CODE OF ORDINANCES, ADOPTING UPDATED IMPACT FEE LAND USE ASSUMPTIONS, UPDATED WATER, WASTEWATER, AND ROADWAY CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PLAN, AND UPDATED IMPACT FEES FOR WATER, WASTEWATER, AND ROADWAY FACILITIES. Mayor White opened the public hearing at 7:46 p.m. and requested the staff report.

Mr. Gibson stated that on April 19, 2016, the Council determined that an update of the impact fee land use assumptions, capital improvements plan, and fees as provided in Chapter 395 of the Texas Local Government Code was necessary, and directed staff to hire consultants to assist in the process. The consultants have had multiple meetings with staff and the Impact Fee Advisory Committee to develop the updated documents and revised collection rates. Mr. Gibson referred to the three documents that were provided to Council. The documents are the Land Use Assumptions for Impact Fees (Exhibit 1), the Water and Wastewater Impact Fee Analysis Capital Improvements Plan (Exhibit 2), and the Roadway Impact Fee Update Final Report (Exhibit 3). The new fees to be charged are higher than the current fees, but are necessary for the needed infrastructure to accommodate growth. Also, the combined water, wastewater, and road impact fee collection rates for a single-family dwelling are still at a lower end compared to many other cities. Mr. Gibson stated that the Impact Fee Advisory Committee and staff recommend that the impact fee increases are necessary to assist in the funding for critical water, wastewater, and roadway projects needed to accommodate future growth, while maintaining the character and quality of life envisioned by city residents in the Lockhart 2020 Comprehensive Plan. The recommended collection rates also rank favorably within the ranges charged by other communities. There was discussion.

Dan Sefko and Daniel Herrig of Freese and Nichols, Inc. presented information and there was discussion regarding the Land Use Assumptions for Impact Fees and Roadway Impact Fee Updates.

Charles Scheler of TRC Engineers, Inc. presented information and there was discussion regarding the Water and Wastewater Impact Fee Analysis Capital Improvements Plan.

There was discussion regarding changing the effective date of the updated impact fees from April 4 to July 4 or October 1 for new construction on lots shown on a development plat or final plat submitted and accepted before those dates. Lots in developments having a development plat or final plat accepted on or after the effective date would be charged the updated impact fees.

Mayor White requested citizens in favor of or against the impact fee updates to address the Council. There were none. He closed the public hearing at 9:05 p.m.

ITEM 4-D. DISCUSSION AND/OR ACTION TO CONSIDER ORDINANCE 2017-08 AMENDING CHAPTER 31 "IMPACT FEES" OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES, INCORPORATING UPDATED LAND USE ASSUMPTIONS AND UPDATED WATER, WASTEWATER, AND ROADWAY CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PLANS AS EXHIBITS; AMENDING THE FEES FOR WATER, WASTEWATER, AND ROAD IMPACT FEES AS SET FORTH IN APPENDIX I; AMENDING AFFECTED SECTIONS REFERENCING THE UPDATED APPENDICIES AND EXHIBITS; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING A REPEALER; AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

Councilmember Hilburn made a motion to approve Ordinance 2017-08, adding an amendment to Section 31-19 providing an exception that new construction on lots shown on a development plat or final plat submitted and accepted before October 1, 2017, shall be those in effect on September 30, 2017, subject to any other applicable exceptions in that section. Councilmember Michelson seconded. The motion passed by a vote of 4-2, with Councilmember Castillo and Mayor Pro-Tem Sanchez opposing.

ITEM 5. CONSENT AGENDA.

Mayor Pro-Tem Sanchez made a motion to approve consent agenda items 5A, 5C, 5D, 5E, and 5F. Councilmember Hilburn seconded. The motion passed by a vote of 6-0.

- 5E: Approve Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) change orders 1, 6 and 7 totaling \$2,418,551.53 most of which was to place underground drainage in Phase II of the US 183 project between Blackjack and Walmart, and appointing the Mayor to sign the documents if approved.
- 5F: Approve proposed increase of \$200.00 per month for Municipal Court Judge, Frank Coggins.

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, the aggregate discretely presented component unit, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the City of Lockhart, Texas (the "City") as of and for the year ended September 30, 2016, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the City's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatements, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. The financial statements of the Lockhart Economic Development Corporation were not audited in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis and budgetary comparison information, schedule of changes in net pension liability and related ratios and the schedule of employer contributions as listed in the table of contents, be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Information

Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the combining nonmajor fund financial statements and the compliance schedules are fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

On April 4, 2017, the Council adopted Ordinance 2017-08 amending Chapter 31 to update the impact fee land use assumptions, the water, wastewater, and roadway capital improvement plans, and the impact fees to be assessed and collected. One part of that ordinance amended Section 31-19, which contains a list of exceptions where the impact fees are either permanently or temporarily adjusted for specific circumstances. As adopted, subsection (b) waived the increase in the impact fee collection rates for new construction on lots shown on a development plat or final plat submitted and accepted before October 1, 2017. As we later realized, though, that left it unclear as to the collection rate of impact fees prior to October 1 on lots that are not required to be platted, and also for permits submitted for building additions. Staff also recommends that instead of vesting lots shown on plats that are "submitted and accepted" by October 1, it should vest lots that are shown on a plat that is "approved" by October 1. Further, because there is no guarantee how soon after a plat is approved and the subdivision is constructed that building permits will be submitted for lots on the plat, the vesting could actually be in affect for many years beyond a reasonable time that staff should be expected to keep track of the different amount of impact fees to be charged. Two years from October 1, 2017, should be sufficient time for a subdivision to be constructed and for its lots to be developed. After that, the new impact fees should apply. This amendment is proposed to correct all of these deficiencies.

ORDINANCE 2017-09

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LOCKHART, TEXAS, AMENDING CHAPTER 31 "IMPACT FEES" OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES, ARTICLE I "GENERAL PROVISIONS", SECTION 31-19 "EXCEPTIONS"; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING A REPEALER; PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION, AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, on April 4, 2017, the City Council adopted Ordinance 2017-08 amending Chapter 31 to update the impact fee land use assumptions, the water, wastewater, and roadway capital improvement plans, and the impact fees to be assessed and collected; and,

WHEREAS, Ordinance 2017-08 amended Section 31-19 "Exceptions", Subsection (b), to waive the increase in the impact fee collection rates for new construction on lots shown on a development plat or final plat submitted and accepted before October 1, 2017; and,

WHEREAS, the new wording of the exception in Section 31-19(b) left it unclear as to the collection rates of impact fees for new construction, as well as building additions, prior to October 1, 2017, on lots that are not required to be platted; and,

WHEREAS, the date that a plat is "submitted and accepted" is not as official as the more definitive date that a plat is "approved"; and,

WHEREAS, it's possible that building permits could be submitted for lots many years after the plat is approved and the subdivision is constructed, when it would be beyond any reasonable time that staff should be expected to keep track of the different amount of impact fees to be charged; and,

WHEREAS, it was the intent of the City Council that the current impact fee collection rates, as adopted by Ordinance 07-11 on March 20, 2007, be continued until October 1, 2017, for all permits for new construction and building additions, in addition to permits issued beyond October 1, 2017, for lots shown on a development plat or final plat approved before October 1, 2017; and,

WHEREAS, it was the intent of the City Council that the applicable impact fee collection rates for building permits for lots in a plat approved before October 1, 2017, should be continued only for two years after October 1, 2017, which would be until October 1, 2019; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to amend Section 31-19(b) in the Code of Ordinances accordingly, and has determined that such amendment serves a public purpose;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LOCKHART, TEXAS, THAT:

I. Chapter 31 "Impact Fees", is hereby amended as follows, wherein all existing articles, sections, subsections, paragraphs and other provisions, or portions thereof, not listed shall remain unchanged:

ARTICLE I. GENERAL PROVISIONS

Section 31-19. Exceptions.

- (b) Impact fees charged for new construction or building additions on lots for which a building permit is submitted before October 1, 2017, or on lots shown on a development plat or final plat approved, before October 1, 2017, and for which a building permit is submitted before October 1, 2019, shall be the amount in Appendix I, Schedule 2, as adopted by Ordinance 07-11, subject to any other applicable exceptions in this section.
- II. <u>Severability</u>: If any provision, section, clause, sentence, or phrase of this ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, void, invalid, or un-enforced, the validity of the remainder of this ordinance or its application shall not be affected, it being the intent of the City Council in adopting and of the Mayor in approving this ordinance that no portion, provision, or regulation contained herein shall become inoperative or fail by way of reasons of any unconstitutionality or invalidity of any other portion, provision, or regulation.
- III. <u>Repealer</u>: That all other ordinances, section, or parts of ordinances heretofore adopted by the City of Lockhart in conflict with the provisions set out above in this ordinance are hereby repealed or amended as indicated.
- IV. <u>Publication</u>: That the City Secretary is directed to cause this ordinance caption to be published in a newspaper of general circulation according to law.
- V. <u>Effective Date</u>: That this ordinance shall become effective and in full force immediately upon its passage.

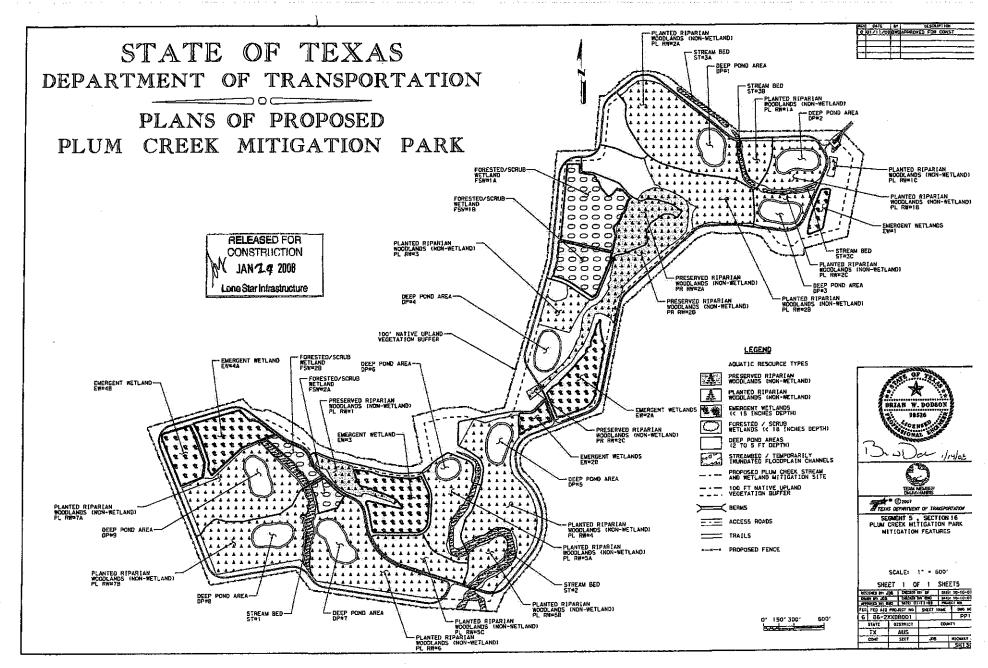

Any required adjustment will be at no cost to Grantor. In addition, this transfer is subject to all matters of public record and to all easements, leases, agreements or licenses, or other interests which affect the property, and to any matter which would be disclosed by title examination, survey, investigation or inquiry, including but not limited to the rights of parties in possession.

No person having a financial interest in any commercial carrier by air, or in any concession, right or privilege to conduct any business or render any service for compensation upon the premises of the Lockhart Municipal Airport shall be eligible for membership on the Lockhart Alrport Advisory Board. Sec. 4-32. Limitations of authority. The Lockhart Municipal Airport Advisory Board shall not have authority to incur or create any debt in connection with airport operations; nor shall the board be empowered to enter into any contract, leases, or other legal obligations binding upon the City of Lockhart; nor shall the board have authority to hire airport personnel or direct airport personnel in the execution of their duties.
NOTES: CONSTRUCTIO N BOARD APPOINTMENTS	Section B101.4, Board Decision, is amended to read as follows: The construction board of adjustments and appeals shall have the power, as further defined in Appendix B, to hear appeals of decisions and interpretations of the building official and consider variances of the technical codes; and to conduct hearings on determinations of the building official regarding unsafe or dangerous buildings, structures and/of service systems, and to issue orders in accordance with the procedures beginning with section 12-442 of this Code [of Ordinances]. Section B101.2, Membership of Board, is amended to read as follows: Each District Council member and the Mayor shall appoint one member to the Construction Board of Appeals making it a five (5) member board and each Councilmember at Large shall appoint an alternate. The term of office of the board members shall be three (3) years, such terms coinciding with the council position making the appointment. In two (2) alternates shall also serve the term coinciding with the council position making the appointments. Vacancies shall be filled for an unexpired term in the manner in which the original appointments are required to be made. Board members shall consist of members who are qualified by experience and/or training to pass on matters pertaining to building construction and are not employees of the City of Lockhart.
NOTES: ELECTRIC BOARD APPOINTMENTS	Sec. 12-132. Members. (a) Appointments to the examining and supervisory board of electricians and appeals shall conform to section 2-210 except that the board shall consist of five persons with one being appointed by each district council member and one by the mayor. Each member shall serve three-year terms with such terms to coincide with the council position making the appointment. (b) Each board member shall reside within the county and such board shall include one member who shall be a building contractor; one layman; two members shall be master electricians who are currently licensed by the city; and one member shall be either a building contractor or master electrician licensed by the city. There shall be two ex-officians who shall be the city electrical inspector, and one shall be the fire marshal. Sec. 12-133. Officers and quorum. The members of the examining and supervising board of electricians and appeals shall select a chairman and secretary. A quorum shall consist of three members.

Sec. 2-209. - Rules for appointment.

The city council hereby sets the following rules:

- (1) Except as may be established by existing city ordinances/resolutions the process for selecting members shall be open to all Lockhart citizens, who must apply for appointment, to include those applying for reappointment. Reappointment shall not be deemed automatic.
- (2) Council shall seek to appoint the most qualified or best persons available, while also respecting the need for diverse community opinions.
- (3) No member of any appointed body shall serve on more than one quasi-judicial or advisory board or commission.
- (4) No appointed body shall deviate from its charge, deliberate items not on its agendas, or speak for the council or City of Lockhart without council authorization.
- (5) Subject to other qualifications as specifically required for membership on the below boards and commissions, the city council shall have the right (but not the duty) to appoint up to two members who are not Lockhart citizens but who are residents of Caldwell County to the Lockhart Airport Advisory Board, the Eugene Clark Library Board, and the construction board of appeals.
- (6) Subject to other qualifications as specifically required for membership on the below boards and commissions, the city council shall have the right (but not the duty) to appoint up to two members who are not Lockhart citizens but who are residents of Caldwell County, to the Lockhart Airport Advisory Board, the Eugene Clark Library Board, and the construction board of appeals.

Section 2-210. Method of selection; number of members; terms.

- (a) The mayor and city councilmembers shall nominate individuals to serve on boards and commissions. Each nomination shall then be confirmed by a simple majority of the entire city council.
- (b) Except as provided herein, there shall be seven members appointed to each board or commission corresponding with the seven members or places of the city council. Each city councilmember, except at provided herein, shall nominate a qualified person to serve in a place on an appointed body corresponding to their place on the council. At-large councilmembers shall be designated as places 5 and 6, and the mayor's position as place 7, for the purpose of this section. Nominations shall be made to fill vacant positions and/or positions whose terms have expired within 90 days of the event, such as a resignation or an election. Should any city councilmember fail to name an appointee to one of his/her corresponding places on any body within the above described 90 days, another councilmember shall then have the privilege to nominate a person to fill that same position, as described in subsection (a). However, once that position becomes vacant again for any reason, the appointment shall revert to the place corresponding with the original city council seat/place number for nominations.
- (c) Beginning with the election in May, 1998, the council shall nominate and confirm four members to serve in places 1, 2, 5, 6 on each board and commission in accordance with subsections (a) and (b) above, and with the standards set in Ordinance Number 97-09, Governance Policies. With the election of May, 1999, the remaining three places shall be filled following the same procedure as above.
- (d)Terms of service on appointed bodies shall be the same three-year terms as the councilmember who nominates a person to serve. However, a person may be appointed to complete the unexpired term of a vacant position, due to a resignation, for example.
- (e) When a person has completed a term, or terms, of service and will be vacating a place, that person may continue to serve until a replacement is nominated and confirmed by the city council.
- (f) At the discretion of the majority of the city council, one Caldwell County resident who is also an owner of real property within any local historic district may be appointed as a full member to the historical preservation commission.
- (g) Exceptions to the above regulations shall be all volunteer/special purpose/ad hoc committees appointed from time to time by the city council and the zoning board of adjustments, whose members shall serve two-year terms in accordance with V.T.C.A., Local Government Code § 211.008. All other provisions of this section, and ordinance number 97-09 which do not conflict with the chapters establishing these bodies shall be applicable.

Sec. 2-212. Removal and resignation of members.

- (a) All board, commission and committee members serve at the pleasure of the city council and may be removed from office with or without cause at the discretion of the city council.
- (b) Board, commission and committee members may resign from office at any time by filing a written resignation, dated and signed by the member, with the City Secretary. Such resignation shall take effect upon receipt by the City Secretary without further action by the city council. If the city council appoints a new member to replace the resigned member, the new member shall be appointed to serve out the remainder of the resigned member's term.
